Report of the Annual Meeting between ICES and RACs (MIRAC 2014)

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1 Opening of the meeting

The new ACOM Chair, Eskild Kirkegaard, opened the meeting and welcomed participants to Copenhagen. Representatives from the North Sea, North Western Waters, Baltic Sea, Pelagic, Long Distance RACs, as well as from EU-DGMARE, EFCA, the ACOM Leadership and ICES staff were in attendance. There were three observers. See list of participants in Annex 1.

Three participants were unfortunately affected by flight delays; the chair of NWWRAC sent his apologies, while representatives form NSRAC and NWWRAC arrived in time for the second day of the meeting.

SWWRAC sent their apologies; a statement from the Secretariat was issued to MIRAC; seen Section 9.5.

2 Adoption of the agenda

After the Tour de Table the draft agenda (Annex 2) was presented and approved.

3 Feedback from the 2013 advisory process

Meeting participants were invited to report on their experience of working with ICES in 2013 and to present their research and advisory needs, and discuss ICES experience of participating in RAC meetings in 2013.

NSRAC: it has been a productive year of cooperation and increasing engagement. But it was unfortunate that it was not possible to have presentation of advice at NSRAC demersal group meeting.

BSRAC: the presentation of advice was welcomed. The RAC has not been sufficiently prepared for the multispecies considerations.

PelRAC: is happy with the collaboration. The miscommunication problems in the past have been solved now. The RAC members who participated in the ICES course with DG MARE are very satisfied.

NWWRAC: appreciates the presentation of advice and the openness of the presenters. They now have a better understanding of the timing issues and they feel there is a need to have a fast track approach between COM, RACs and ICES. They also appreciate the benchmarking workshops – specifically Colm and Carmen. They also appreciate the training course.

SWWRAC: is happy with the presentation of advice.

LDRAC: Their stocks are not so much dealt with by ICES, but they have some interest in the north, they are pleased with having ICES at meetings there.

4 Review of advice in 2013 and new developments in 2014

Regarding MSY/Mixed fisheries, etc. the RACs raised the issue that for the Baltic, there was only a multispecies advice for the eastern cod stock. They would like to see it for the western cod stock as well.

The chair informed on the development of the ICES Advice Plan, 2014–2018, which was to be seen as one out of four pillars implementing the ICES Strategic Plan, 2014–2018 (ISP), adopted by Council in October 2013. The following was highlighted:

- while the ISP is in line with the ICES Convention and the Copenhagen
 Declaration, it is also based on a scoping document on the current and
 future policy and research landscape within which ICES operates;
- a key challenge identified in the ISP is the commitment to build the foundation of science towards integrated ecosystem understanding, and the identification of the following strategic choices; to further develop the work on the Arctic and aquaculture as well as to enhance the training programme;
- key principles identified in the ISP are to focus on addressing information gaps and needs, to focus work on the ICES niches and seek strategic partnerships, bearing in mind the economic and personnel constraints in the countries/expert network;
- the ISP will be implemented through the new associated plans, 2014–2018 for Science, Advisory Services, Data and Information, and the Secretariat, which will be adopted in February 2014, incorporating comments from Council;
- the four associated plans are synchronized, interdependent and interlinked, and based on the goals and supporting activities outlined in the ISP;
- a key role for Bureau and Council will be the regular evaluation of the status of implementation of the ISP and associated plans, highlighting the importance of performance measures and indicators, and that these plans are living documents that will be updated as necessary;

The Chair specifically highlighted the supporting activities, which the Advice Plan needs to fulfill to meet the goal "Producing the information and advice that decision-makers need", and which can be condensed as follows:

- deliver recurrent advice;
- respond to the evolving policy context and special requests;
- · promote use and delivery of integrated advice;
- ensure quality assurance, interaction with advice recipients and stakeholders as well as communication with the informed public.

The aim of the Advice Plan thus is to ensure that ICES can deliver the advice of today, and stay relevant for the advice of tomorrow.

Upcoming activity

A launch of the ISP and the associated plans is intended in connection with a marine environment conference in Brussels, 3–4 March, 2014 on "Healthy Oceans – Productive Ecosystems".

5 Requests for advice, Workplan 2014 and arrangements for communication with stakeholders

The Workplan 2014 was presented and it was agreed that RACs would approach ICES regarding the details of their wishes for advice presentations during the year.

Advice dissemination including the ICES web site and popular version of advice

Feedback from several RACs and national representatives was very positive on the popular advice, with requests for permission to further disseminate it to their clients via web links, hardcopy, and their national media outlets. The EC was very positive, but looking for a larger user community and interactive user interface, which ICES is actively working toward. Note that the EC has a publicity campaign beginning about sustainable seafood that will tie to the popular advice.

The meeting was given a general introduction to the website, as well as more specific examples of how to search for information.

The ICES secretariat always welcomes feed-back from the users of the ICES website, and to the extent possible tries to accommodate these. Any problems related to searching for information on the website can be addressed to the ICES Secretariat (info@ices.dk, (terhi@ices.dk)), who will be pleased to help out. In connection with physical meetings in the ICES HQs, there is also a possibility to have specific demonstration sessions.

The website aims to reach out to and inform new users, not familiar with ICES and at the same time also serve the ICES community, as an addition to the information that the every-day user will find on the SharePoint site.

7 MSY-in an ecosystem context

The clients of ICES have recently expressed that they prefer to postpone the dialogue meeting to spring 2015; this was more or less accepted by the RACs. The fishery part of the RACs expressed a strong wish to have a range of MSYs for a given stock and ecosystem and multispecies considerations could be taken into account when setting such ranges.

8 Outcomes of ICES WGMARS 2013 November meeting

The WGMARS 2013 report was presented by Steve Mackinson.

RACs noted that the largest challenges for cooperation are the landings obligation and the move to regional management. It is not clear how science needs in relation to discard plans are to be met. There is a need to redefine science needs from ICES system.

9 Points from the RACs

The NWWRAC proposed the following items for discussion:

- 1) Review on cooperation between ICES and RACs in relation to data deficiencies for stock assessments: state of play and way forward. The point was raised and presented by the NWWRAC / Barrie Deas Docs 10a and b. The discussion highlighted that there on one hand is a political wish to improve data collection on non-target species but that it on the other hand must be very clear to the industry that the data collected are used and useful as it may be a big burden for fishers to record these data. It is important that end users (ICES in this case) report back to the industry whether data are useful.
- 2) Latest developments in methodology for data-limited stocks; i.e. conclusions of WKLIFEIII, WKUPDATE, etc. (Presentation by ICES Doc 4ii);
 Overall the response from RACs, the EC and national representatives was very positive; they were happy to have quantitative advice on many DLS. The Baltic RAC expressed doubts on the use/necessity of precautionary tools (PA buffer and uncertainty cap) for DLS as well as the use of catch data to produce catch advice. The EC is looking for possibilities to have MSY advice for DLS stocks, with high priority for economically important stocks including mackerel, anglerfish, megrims, *Nephrops* and pollock. Understanding how biodiversity concerns can be addressed within the DLS framework is also a priority.
- 3) Outcomes of ICES WKMARS, Stockholm, 4–5 November 2013 (Eibhlín O'Sullivan and other RAC Secretariats) (*Agenda item 8*);
 - The RACS expressed frustration at the way projects are assessed and then funded via the EU framework system. There was broad agreement that the expectation of tools for management would naturally flow from these projects was unrealistic. The proposal evaluation mechanism should change. There was also agreement that "stakeholder" fatigue was prevalent throughout the system.
- 4) Review of evolution in the role of the stakeholders in the ICES advisory process (e.g., benchmark process, ACOM ADGs...)

There was a general appreciation of the openness of ICES to let stakeholders participate in the advisory process. However, also stakeholders faced restraints in their resources, which were both an issue of having an expert available to participate in a meeting as well as an issue of not being able to participate in the entire meeting, but only for one to two days.

Acknowledging that cooperation takes time, there was a fear that the workload runs the risk of destroying the existing interaction and dialogue with stakeholders.

One way to solve this would be by enrolling more persons to the ICES training courses as well as using the Working Group on Maritime Systems (WGMARS) as a think tank to deal with this issue.

Summary

The increasing work load influences the possibility for stakeholders to send experts to the meetings and participate throughout their entirety. There are no easy solutions to this.

Upcoming activity

The next meeting of WGMARS (planned for December, 2014 – which many found was a difficult month) could be asked to look into this. The ICES training programme could be an intermediate solution.

1) Open discussion with ICES on methodology and timescale for implementation of MSY framework to fisheries management in light of the CFP Basic Regulation which introduces some flexibility in the system; i.e. MSY shall be reached by 2015 where possible and, at the latest by 2020 for all stocks. The ICES transition to the MSY advice which has been applied to the ICES advice since 2010 with a gradual reduction in F advice has now come to its final step where ICES will advise on FMSY. Thus, this is in line with the time frame of 2015 in the new CFP. There is however some uncertainty about how to deal with biomass levels in the MSY context. For instance all stocks cannot be rebuilt to MSY biomass levels as they are estimated based in single stock models. The solution is an ecosystem approach instead. ICES will continue working on this. The dialogue meeting in autumn 2014 or spring 2015 is part of this plan.

The Pelagic RAC proposed the following item for discussion:

1) Procedure that ICES uses when choosing external reviewers.

This was specifically about ICES advice re blue whiting. The Pelagic RAC had developed a HCR, but the review was negative. ICES explained that independence and relevant qualifications are guiding principles and that it would be against the integrity of reviews if ICES would try to influence the process by selecting reviewers based on anything else.

10 AOB

ICES noted that the MIRAC meeting in practice had become a meeting between ICES and stakeholders and stated that ICES wished the meeting to serve such a general purpose in the future. This means that the scope of the meeting should be expanded to include non-EU issues and to include stakeholders with an interest in policies beyond fisheries policy.

Some RACs and a COM representative expressed a wish to maintain a specific RAC space in the meeting. ICES stated that a future stakeholder meeting with an expanded scope would be set up to accommodate the wishes of the RACs within the meeting.
